


# Invitation to the **Forensic Collaboration Conference**





### **Forensic Collaboration Conference**

#### Background

Collaboration in the forensic arena is closely interwoven with other collaborative initiatives in policing, most notably protective services. These can include ad-hoc local initiatives through to formal agreements between participating authorities.

Undertaking collaboration is challenging but can bring huge benefits to improve services. However, when combined with a drive to increase efficiencies it becomes even more difficult to achieve.

The NPIA Forensics21 Programme is hosting an ACPOled one day collaboration conference to bring together forensic practitioners to understand the challenges facing forces and to share lessons learnt.

#### Aims of the day:

- Gain an understanding of what collaboration actually means
- Identify the benefits collaboration can bring
- Identify the barriers to collaboration
- Understand the key lessons learnt from past experiences
- Understand what support needs to be given to achieve successful collaboration.
