1. PURPOSE OF PAPER

1.1 The purpose of this paper is to seek Members' agreement in relation to inspection activity planned by Her Majesty's Inspectorate of Constabulary (HMIC) during this performance year.

2. BACKGROUND

- 2.1 Following the publication of the policing Green Paper last year, the Home Office declared an intention to step back from target-setting and monitoring police performance. The HMIC has now been assigned the lead role in monitoring overall performance and identifying and challenging under-performing forces in the public interest.
- 2.2 Following an action arising out of the last full Police Authority meeting, the Head of Strategic Development met with the HMIC Staff Officer on 8 July 2009 to seek clarification around the expected inspection programme for British Transport Police (BTP). An update is provided for Members at Appendix A. The Chief Executive to the Authority and Chair of this Committee have been kept informed regarding discussions and it has been agreed by the Chair that a regular HMIC update be provided to the Audit & Corporate Governance (A&CG) Committee as a standing item for future meetings.



2.3 If Members approve the Inspection Programme as set out in Appendix A, the Chief Constable and the Chair to the A&CG Committee will meet with Her Majesty's Inspector of Constabulary to formalise the inspection programme.

3. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

3.1 The British Transport Police Authority (BTPA) holds the budget for HMIC inspections. Whilst the fee for the coming year's inspection activity has not been discussed in detail, it is likely to be approximately £80,000.

4. **RISK IMPLICATIONS**

4.1 There are no risk implications arising directly from this paper.

5. DIVERSITY ISSUES

5.1 There are no diversity issues arising directly from this paper.

6. **RECOMMENDATIONS**

6.1 That Members note the contents of this paper and agree to the inspection programme, which includes a Rounded Assessment of BTP, but excludes a bespoke Policing Pledge inspection.
