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# That's a nice little earner! £1m bonuses for rail chiefs just to stop them leaving

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Rail bosses have approved £1million in taxpayer-funded bonuses for three directors in order to stop them from being poached.

The performance-related payments of £300,000 each will be made on top of the trio's £360,000-plus salaries.

They were approved at Network Rail's annual general meeting, triggering anger among union members.

The bonuses will go to operations director Robin Gisby, infrastructure director Simon Kirby and finance director Patrick Butcher in 2014.

Astonishingly, Network Rail chief executive Sir David Higgins dismissed the sums as 'not a huge incentive' to make the trio stay. He said: 'If they really want to go, they will go.'

Union activists from the Transport Salaried Staffs' Association (TSSA) dressed as Fat Controllers protested outside the meeting in Glasgow as Network Rail nodded through the so-called 'golden carrot' retention payments.

The company's latest accounts show Mr Gisby earns a basic salary of £360,000, Mr Kirby £360,000 and Mr Butcher £382,000.

Following intense pressure from Transport Secretary Justine Greening and wider public anger over the railway bonus culture, Sir David, who earns £560,000, announced in February that he and other board members would forgo any bonus for this year.

The company – which is given £4billion a year from the taxpayer – has also been warned it may be fined if its targets are not met by 2013/14.

Of the latest payments, a Network Rail spokesman said: 'These are retention bonuses.

'We know that all three of the directors have been approached by other companies to be poached, and we haven't got a bonus scheme in place.

'The board's and indeed the Office Of Rail Regulation's concern was that they could walk away right in the middle of us trying to deliver some rather big projects.

'As long as they are still here in 2014 and their personal performance is at least as good, they will get the payment.'

The arrangement would be better described as a 'golden carrot' as it contains no contractual ties, the spokesman added.
